Guidelines for Reorganization:

The following procedure will occur for the Commission to reorganize:

- 1. The Chair turns the meeting over to the Commission Secretary, who presides over the nomination of the new Chair.
- 2. The Commission Secretary indicates that Nominations are now in order for the Chair of the Park and Recreation Commission for the City of Signal Hill.
- 3. Any member of the Commission may nominate any member for the Chair. No second is required.
- 4. The Commission Secretary states, Commissioner has been nominated. Are there any further nominations for Chair? The Commission Secretary repeats each nomination in this way until all nominations for the office are made.
- 5. When it appears no one else wishes to make a nomination, the Commission Secretary again states, Are there any further nominations for Chair? If not, nominations are now closed, without waiting for a motion to that effect.
- 6. After completion of the nominations, the Commission Secretary should provide each nominee with an opportunity to speak regarding his or her qualifications for the position.
- 7. The Commission Secretary shall then conduct a roll call vote for the selection of Chair asking each member to vote for the nominee of his or her choice. The vote shall be conducted in alphabetical order as follows:

Commissioner Edwards
Commissioner Gidwani
Commissioner Kiss-Lee

- 8. The Commission Secretary then declares the result of the election. The nominee receiving a majority vote of the Commission shall be declared the new Chair.
- 9. After selection of the new Chair, the Commission Secretary turns the meeting over to the newly elected Chair who is given an opportunity to make any remarks, which they may wish to make upon entering office.
- 10. The new Chair then presides over the selection of the Vice-Chair, calling for the nominations and conducts the vote, as with the selection of the Chair.
- 11. The new Chair is also given an opportunity to make any remarks, which they may wish to make upon entering office.

Goal No. 5 Strengthen internal communication, recruitment, retention, systems, and processes to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of City services.

Recommendation:

Background and Analysis:

Staff recommend that park assignments be distributed as follows given their proximity to each other by area (Attachment A):

1. Reservoir Park, Signal Hill Dog Park

- 2. Signal Hill Park, Heritage Point Park, and Calbrisas Park
- 3. Sunset View Park, Hilltop Park
- 4. Discovery Well Park, Panorama Promenade
- 5. Raymond Arbor Park and Hillbrook Park

Commissioners will provide feedback about:

- 1. Design of the park as it relates to amenities and user experience for consideration of future new park improvements.
- 2. Connectivity of the park in relation to other City buildings, parks, and amenities;
- 3. Overall experience and observations about the park.


Each commissioner will provide feedback in the form of a presentation (visual presentation with photos) to document and share their experience with each assigned park and discuss consideration for prioritizing maintenance needs and improvements on an annual basis each April or May. This will ensure that presentations are given prior to expiring terms and create a consistent schedule for commissioners to follow.

Additionally, commissioners will visit their assigned parks throughout the year, creating the opportunity to share feedback with staff on a regular basis through communication or utilizing the City's mobile application or iWorqs platforms, to help expedite addressing topics such as safety concerns, graffiti, or other items that commissioners would like to bring to the attention of staff/City.

Further, with anticipated future potential renovations to parks and enhancements, including Reservoir Park and Signal Hill Park, the commissioners will be asked to provide their input and feedback in the design process. This information will be taken into consideration as part of the park improvement process.

Park assignments are brought before the commission each June for consideration of updating assignments in anticipation of potential newly appointed commissioners attending their first meeting in June.

- All nominations received will be presented to the Parks and Recreation Commission each month, based on the timeline, below.



Ground breaking for the project is anticipated by fall 2025, with project completion by the end of the 2026 calendar year.

GEMS ON THE HILL EVENT

Summary:

The Parks and Recreation Commission will consider a fee waiver request from the Long Beach Mineral and Gem Society (LBMGS), a local non-profit organization, to host a Gems on the Hill event, at the Signal Hill Public Library Signal Point Terrace, Zinnia Courtyard, Children's Area, and Community Room on Saturday, October 11 and Sunday, October 12, 2025 and display two banners at the Library Terrace as well as Cherry and Hill Street in advance of the event.

Strategic Plan Goal(s):

Goal No. 5 High-Functioning Government: Strengthen internal communication, recruitment, retention, systems, and processes to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of City services.

Recommendation:

Staff recommend the Parks and Recreation Commission approve the LBMGS request for a waiver of fees for the Signal Point Terrace, Zinnia Courtyard, Children's Area, and the Community Room for Saturday, October 11 and Sunday, October 12 and display two banners at the Library Terrace and at the corner of Cherry and Hill Street.

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Background:

The Long Beach Mineral and Gem Society (LBMGS), is a local non-profit organization that is dedicated to fostering the study of mineralogy and collection of specimens, and the Art of Lapidary. The group's passionate and knowledgeable members bring together a diverse range of skills and expertise spanning from geologic sciences and lapidary craftsmanship (jewelry and metalsmithing arts). The LBMGS membership consists of approximately 40 volunteers, all knowledgeable in the fields of geology, gemology, mining, and lapidary arts. The purpose of the Gems on the Hill event is to educate the community on gems and minerals and the event is open to the public, which will allow library patrons and community members to visit the family-friendly interactive activities, vendors, and guest speaker program.

In June 2022, May 2023, and May 2024, the Parks and Recreation Commission approved a fee waiver request for the LBMGS to host their Gems on the Hill event each year. In good faith of fostering a partnership with the City, the LBMGS has hosted two to three programs each year "

In consideration of this year's facility fee waiver request, LBMGS has proposed to host up to three future library programs for the community. The proposed programs will be designed to engage children and families as well as offer an educational guest speaker for adults and seniors.

At each of the recent events, LBMGS showcased geology, provided public demonstrations on geode cutting and jewelry making. LBMGS also featured several interactive kids' activities where children discovered various minerals and gems by digging in the sand. The two-day event attracted more than 600 attendees to the Signal Hill Public Library which also included more than 20 vendors. Funds raised from the vendor fees are used for the club to provide free programs to the community, including in the City of Signal Hill throughout the year.

Analysis:

The Long Beach Mineral and Gem Society requested a waiver pursuant to the City of Signal Hill Policy 4.16 for City Facilities. The Long Beach Mineral and Gem Society plans to hold a Gems on the Hill event on October 11 and October 12, 2025. The LBMGS applied for Use of Indoor City Facilities and included a letter detailing the event (Attachment A).

In accordance with the City's policies granting fee waivers for City facilities, the applicant must submit a waiver request and meet the general requirements and criteria established by the City of Signal Hill Policy 4.16 - Waiver of Fees for Facilities (Attachment B). The Waiver Policy requires the Parks and Recreation Commission to make the following findings prior to granting approval:

- 1. The group is currently registered as a non-profit organization with the California Secretary of State.
- 2. The group is considered "in good standing" with the City.
- 3. The event or activity proposed directly benefits the residents of Signal Hill.
- 4. The group is domiciled within Signal Hill.

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5. The group has a membership of at least 51% Signal Hill residents or 51% Signal Hill business employees.

LBMGS has been a supporter and partner with Signal Hill Public Library since 2022. Over the past three years, LBMGS has provided eight free programs to the Signal Hill community. The chart below shows the programs that LBMGS has provided to the Signal Hill community free of charge.

Geode cutting – geodes are round rocks that kids would pick out their own and we would slice them open with a special saw to expose the crystal structures inside. We must charge \$3.00 for each that covers our costs for the material. Each piece is unique.

Kids Arts and Crafts – Make and take home a painted rock. FREE

Gemstone Dig – We fill bins with sand and kids hunt around to find treasure (polished rocks, crystals) in the mix with a sieve. We provide a bag for them to take what they find home. FREE

Spin the Wheel - Rock related wheel of fortune with rock related prizes. FREE

Adopt a Rock - Pet rock that comes with care instructions. FREE

We may have additional ideas along with these themes for kids as well.

Vendors:

Vendors would sign up for the show using an application form that we provide outlining an agreement between LBMGS and their entity to sell their goods. Vendors pay for a table space at a flat rate in advance and will provide their own displays, lighting props. We also ask each vendor to donate an item suitable for our fundraiser raffle. Vendors agree to provide proof of Sellers Permit and Liability insurance. We have about 90% of last year's vendors wishing to join us again this year. LBMGS will handle all correspondence with the show vendors.

Insurance:

Through our parent organization CFMS we qualify for special liability coverage through McDaniel Insurance Services, LLC. We can provide our annual declaration page for your review, and once a Show date is set, we can apply for a certificate of insurance for the specific dates. This coverage is tailored to Mineral and Gem Shows. We can provide more details on request.

Advertising:

We will print and distribute a color postcard advertising our event as soon as possible. Distribution will be City wide at local events, our location at the Long Beach Senior Center, LA based rock clubs, schools and local businesses.

We will post the event on our Facebook page, Instagram page and local newspapers immediately. Coordination with the Library's social media postings would be beneficial to all in order to reach the intended audience.

We anticipate that the City of Signal Hill Parks and Rec would allow us to hang a banner on the Cherry Ave sign to advertise to passing traffic for at least 3 weeks leading up to the event. We found that this is a crucial step in advertising.

On the event day we would like to display "A" signs on the sidewalks surrounding the buildings directing guests to the upstairs terrace and Community Room.

Guest Speaker Program:

As part of our event, we would like to include one or more guest speakers who would give a lecture and present a slide show on a geological topic at a chosen time for anyone to attend. Perhaps 1 hour lecture length.

LBMGS Raffle:

We will conduct a new raffle each day of the show with over 50 individual prizes. This RAFFLE is key for our Society to generate funds for our programs. Items are donated from Club members and Vendors.

Snacks:

We would like to use the facilities to offer packaged drinks and snacks throughout the Show.

Library Display

We would like the opportunity to continue a Gem and Mineral display inside the Library leading up to the show.

Waiver of Fee's for City Facilities 4.16

I. **PURPOSE**

To set forth in writing the City's position in regards to the waiver of fees for the Community Center, Spud Field, Signal Hill Park Amphitheater, Basketball Courts, Library Meeting Room, Picnic Shelters, and Hilltop Grass Area.

П. **GENERAL POLICY**

A. Fees for the use of city facilities are established annually by ordinance of the City Council. The Community Services Director has been given the authority to waive or reduce deposits, but cannot waive facility fees or staff fees. Waiver of these fees can only be done by the Parks and Recreation Commission and the City Council respectively.

In order to request a waiver the applicant must:

- Submit an application for Use of City Facilities and attach a 1. letter for waiver of fees.
- 2. Prove that the general requirements stated in this policy have been met.

To be considered for a waiver the Applicant must meet all of the following criteria:

- a. The Applicant Must Be a Signal Hill Resident. Proof of residency must be furnished to City staff.
- b. The individual or Organization Must Have Nonprofit Status with the Internal Revenue Service. Proof of nonprofit status by the I.R.S. must be furnished to City staff.
- c. The organization's primary focus must be on serving the residents of Signal Hill. Proof of such service by way of programs, services or activities offered to the community must be provided.
- d. The organization's voting board must be comprised of at least 51% Signal Hill residents.

It is advisable that the applicant appears at the meeting when the waiver is requested to respond to any questions of the City Council or Parks and Recreation Commission.

- B. Non-profits not based in Signal Hill will be prohibited from conducting any fundraising activities in any City Park or facility including raffles.
- C. Musical events will be prohibited after dusk and will also be prohibited during the months of June, July and August.
- D. Events numbering more than 25 people will be prohibited at Hilltop Park, with the exception of the wedding space, which will permit up to 75 people for up to 3 hours.
- E. Any events which may significantly impact noise, traffic or public use of the park, deemed so by the Director of Community Services, must be approved by the City Council at least sixty days prior to the event.

III. FACILITY FEE WAIVER

- 1. The City Council has given the Parks and Recreation Commission authority to waive facility fees. In order to request a waiver, the applicant must:
 - A. Submit an application for Use of City Facilities.
 - B. Attach a letter for waiver of fees.
 - C. Prove that the general use requirements stated in this policy have been met.
- 2. Request must be received a minimum of one week prior to the next scheduled Parks and Recreation Commission meeting.

IV. STAFF FEE WAIVER

- 1. In the event staff is required to supervise the City facility, City Council shall review the application for waiver of staff fees and shall make the final determination on the waiver of fees.
- 2. Request must be received a minimum of one week prior to the next scheduled City Council Meeting.

V. **DEPOSITS**

No deposit shall be waived for any individual or organization without written documentation from the Director of Community Services.

VI. GENERAL USE REQUIREMENTS

- A. All established rules and regulations, policies and procedures contained in the Facility Use Policy shall apply to fee exempt groups.
- B. The frequency of use at each facility shall not exceed a total of once per week by fee exempt groups.
- C. Approved Waiver of Fees shall not imply a monopoly of the facility or an automatic renewal of waiver.
- D. City sponsored programs have priority for facility use. Any reservation may be cancelled by the City.

VII. SPECIAL AGREEMENTS

Community Center:

Signal Hill Lions Club rental fees will be waived twice a (calendar) year for their annual fundraising events in view of their help in the construction of the facility. Staff fees still apply.

The LBUSD may use the facility without rental fees based on the most current joint use agreement. Staff fees will apply.

Signal Hill Home Owner Associations' (HOA) and/or their Management Company's rental fees, will be waived twice a calendar year, for their HOA meetings. Staff fees still apply and a refundable cash deposit must remain. (City Council action, July 8, 2003)

There are no additional existing agreements for the waiver of fees.

VIII. EXCEPTIONS

There shall be no exceptions to this policy unless authorized by the Community Services Director.
